4. Action Items

A. Edina Waiver for LMR-53

Andrew LaVenture said the proposal states that the City of Edina is looking to utilize up to six permanent Push-to-Talk over cellular connections between Edina owned talkgroups and LTE devices by way of donor and gateway radios. This will be in compliance with the LMR-53 requirements. The city of Edina departments may choose PTT applications that meet their operational requirements so long as they integrate with JPS Interoperability Solutions gateway devices.

Jake Thompson said Isanti County recently had the same request approved. There will be a Chisago County request coming in the future.

Motion (Vadnais/DeMuth) to approve the Edina Waiver for LMR-53. Motion passed.

B. Standard 3.30.0 METCOM Revisions

Tracey Fredrick said METCOM requests were discussed at the January Radio TOC. At that time, it was not clear in the standard who could request this access and who could get access. The Standards workgroup reviewed Standard 3.30.0 and clarified some of the language. Most of that language is from dispatch centers to PSAPs and clarified how and when the talkgroup can be used and who can request access.

Ron Jansen asked if the current waivers are still being enforced.

Fredrick said yes, and has not received any communication to revoke any waivers.

Motion (Jansen/Vadnais) to approve Standard 3.30.0 METCOM revisions. Motion passed.

C. New Representative for SECB LMR Committee STR Workgroup

Fredrick said Curt Meyer was the primary Radio TOC Representative to the STR Workgroup and the alternate to the LMR Committee. Meyer retired the end of last month. Nick Schatz has expressed an interest in becoming the primary STR Workgroup Representative and the alternate to the LMR Committee. Before leaving Meyer said that Mike Parker would volunteer to be the alternate to the STR Workgroup.

Motion (Jansen/DeMuth) to appoint Nick Schatz as the new primary representative to the STR Workgroup and the alternate representative to the LMR Committee, and Mike Parker as the alternate to the STR Workgroup. Motion passed.

5. Moves, Additions & Changes to the System

John Anderson said Motorola has finished installing the SRX router pair in all of the MSOs. Motorola is going to upgrade the hosting software package the week of April 11th. The impact would be on the controller's switch.

Jansen said that as he went through Dakota County's consoles looking for AES, there were some that did not have AES in them. These could have been due to advanced replacement, but as entities are checking for encryption, just make sure to check all devices.

Nate Timm said the St. Paul Park site was put on a temporary tower last week, due to repainting. There was some diminished capacity but no dramatic degradation. It should be wrapped up by late summer.

6. Committee Reports

A. Metro Mobility System Usage Update

Chad LeVasseur said numbers remain same/low.

B. System Owners Group Update - No Meeting

C. MnDOT ARMER System Update

Anderson said the switches ordered for the ethernet back haul may be delayed until mid-October. The installations will start in the northern regions and work down to the metro.

Anderson is also in touch with LOGIS to see what entities are dependent on the LOGIS ATIA feed. If it is found no one is reliant on that feed, they will probably remove the connections for that.

Anderson confirmed to Jansen that Anderson, Tim Lee, Dave Pagel and Guy Chambers will be involved in the encryption summit.

D. SECB Committees

i. Steering

Rohret said the committee met on March 9. Discussions included state-wide and regional governance language in MN Statute 403 and filling vacancies on the Steering Committee. There were committee reports on progress on SCIP goals, an ECN update, NG9-1-1/GIS workgroup update and some open reports and discussions.

ii. LMR - no meeting

iii. WBBA

Rod Olson said at the WBBA in March there were reminders for the Minnesota Public Safety Communications Conference in April and the Encryption Summit on May 4 and 5. There were SCIP discussions about working on communication to Incident Response groups and information for the updated MNFOG. There was an Operation Safety Net discussion on how cellular and radio were used and how to order broadband coverage and get that information out to communications response groups. There are still WBBA vacancies that need to be filled.

Olson said the there was discussion about what would be presented at the Breezy Point conference. There will be an overview of FirstNet with some demos and buildout and future

build outs. There was a vendor session from Verizon.

iv. IOC & Workgroups

a.IOC

Jake Thompson said the Interoperability Committee met on March 15. Discussed were the Breezy Point Communications Conference, COMT awards and COML renewals, SCIP goals, committee vacancies, OSN After-Action report, MNFOG survey revision, COMU workgroup updates, strategic technology reserve workgroup reports, EMS and hospital workgroup report.

Jansen said the MNFOG survey was very different from what was actually sent out. The survey was actually regarding a cache equipment that looks like it will be included in the MNFOG. It did not appear to have any information on frequencies.

b. COMU Workgroup – no meeting

C. STR Workgroup - no meeting

Nick Schatz said he and Mike Parker from Hennepin County did visit the STR trailer this month. There will need to be an alternative solution for the batteries which failed at the last preventative maintenance test.

Jansen asked if a portable generator had been discussed at STR meeting. Schatz said not specifically, but this would be desired, as batteries tend to fail often.

Jansen asked if the trailer location has been discussed, now that two of the main people involved are no longer on the committee. Fredrick said this topic is on the schedule for discussion at the next CRTF workgroup meeting. Scott Gerber said he thought Eden Prairie could assist with the trailer storage.

Mike Parker said that Hennepin County does have keys to access where the STR trailer is stored currently.

v. IPAWS

Scott Haas said at last month's meeting the revisions to MNFOG were discussed and the communications conference presentation for different uses for IPAWS was finalized.

vi. Finance/Grants Workgroup

Fredrick said both groups met in March. Discussed at the March 10th Finance Committee were the Backer bill which addresses surplus money for encrypted radios across the state, SCIP goals and a draft of a letter to the Minnesota Indian Affairs Council regarding vacancies on committees.

Fredrick said the Grants Workgroup met on March 2nd. Discussions included proposals from the Southwest region on how to get some governance money. This is a continuing discussion.

Fredrick said also discussed was the closing out of the NG9-1-1 grants money, which included both GIS and CPE. The SECB grant has been signed so money can now be spent.

7. Other Business

A. METAC Permission update

Fredrick said there have been no new requests.

B. METCOM Discussion - no items

This will be removed from next month's agenda.

Jeff Bjorklund said Ryan DeYoung will replace him as primary Radio TOC member.

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NATIONAL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM POSITION TASK BOOK

Position Task Books (PTB) are developed for designated Incident Command System (ICS) positions¹ as described under the National Integration Center (NIC) and have been incorporated into the National Incident Management System (NIMS). The PTB is used by the authority having jurisdiction, to certify that the person to whom the task book belongs meets the standards recommended by the NIC.

Each PTB lists the performance requirements (tasks) for the specific position in a format that allows a trainee to be evaluated against written guidelines. Successful performance of all tasks, as observed and recorded by an evaluator, will result in a recommendation that the trainee be recognized in that position.

Evaluation and confirmation of the individual's performance of all the tasks may involve more than one evaluator and varied activities such as Incidents, Planned Events, Functional Exercises (FE), Full Scale Exercises (FSE), Drills, Simulation, Classroom, or Daily Job functions (as specified in the task tables). It is important that performance be critically evaluated and accurately recorded by each evaluator. All tasks must be evaluated, and bullet statements within a task that require an action must be demonstrated before that task can be signed off.

A brief list of responsibilities also appears below.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- 1. The Trainee is responsible for:
 - Fulfilling the pre-requisite requirements:²
 - Public safety background with three years of experience in dispatch
 - Awareness of fundamental public safety communications technology
 - Awareness of the ICS Communications Unit function
 - Completion of IS-100.b, IS-144, IS-200.b, IS-700.a, and IS-800.b
 - Reviewing and understanding instructions in the PTB.
 - Identifying desired objectives/goals.
 - Providing background information to an evaluator.
 - Requesting Agency Head to initiate the PTB; putting name on cover and second page, initials on subsequent pages.
 - Satisfactorily demonstrating completion of all tasks for an assigned position within three years of the Date Initiated.
 - Assuring the evaluation record is complete.
 - Notifying their agency head when the PTB is completed, and obtaining their signature recommending certification.
 - Keeping the original PTB in personal records.
 - Providing copies of their completed PTB to the designated authorities within their

home agency, jurisdiction, region, or state in accordance with applicable SOPs for recognition of Communications Unit (COMU) positions.

- 2. The **Evaluator** is responsible for:
 - Being qualified and proficient in the position being evaluated, or higher ICS position (e.g. IC, COML, INTD, etc.).
 - Meeting with the trainee and determining past experience, current qualifications, and desired objectives/goals.
 - Reviewing tasks with the trainee.
 - Explaining to the trainee the evaluation procedures that will be utilized and which objectives may be attained.
 - Identifying tasks to be performed during the evaluation period.
 - Accurately evaluating and recording demonstrated performance of tasks. Dating and initialing completion of the task shall document satisfactory performance. Unsatisfactory performance shall be documented in the Evaluation Record.
 - Completing an Evaluation Record found at the end of each PTB.
- 3. The **Final Evaluator** is responsible for signing the verification statement inside the front cover of the PTB when all tasks have been initialed.
- 4. The **Agency Head** or designee is responsible for:
 - Selecting trainees based on the needs of their organization or area Incident Management Teams.
 - Providing opportunities for evaluation and/or making the trainee available for evaluation.
 - Initiating the PTB to document task performance.
 - Explaining to the trainee the purpose and processes of the PTB, as well as the trainee's responsibilities.
 - Tracking progress of the trainee.
 - Identifying incident evaluation opportunities.
 - Identifying and assigning an evaluator that can provide a positive experience for the trainee, and make an accurate and honest appraisal of the trainee's performance.
 - Documenting the assignment.
 - Conducting progress reviews.
 - Conducting a closeout interview with the trainee and evaluator and assuring that documentation is proper and complete.
 - Providing trainees the opportunity to attend the applicable training course(s).

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING THE EVALUATION RECORD

There are four separate pages provided to allow evaluations to be made during four separate occasions. These evaluations may be made on Incidents, Planned Events, Functional Exercises, Full Scale Exercises, Simulations, Drills, Classroom, or Daily Job functions (as specified in the Task tables). This should be sufficient for qualification in the position if the individual is adequately prepared. If additional evaluation pages are needed, they can be copied from a blank task book and attached. (Remember to change the Evaluation Record # to the next sequential number.)

COMPLETE THESE ITEMS AT THE END OF THE EVALUATION PERIOD:

Trainee's name and Trainee's position: Self Explanatory

Evaluator's name, title and agency: List the name of the evaluator, and his/her incident position (on incidents) or office title, and agency.

Evaluator's agency address, e-mail address and phone: Self explanatory

Evaluation Record #: The number prepopulated in the upper left corner of the evaluation page identifies a particular experience or group of experiences. This number should be placed in the column labeled "Evaluation Record #" on the Qualification Record for each task performed satisfactorily during the evaluation opportunity.

Name and Location of Incident or Situation: Identify the name of the incident (if there is one) and the location where the tasks were performed. If evaluation occurs during a short term situation rather than a named incident, list the responding agency and area.

Incident Kind: Enter kind of incident, e.g., hurricane, wild land fire, search and rescue, flood, preplanned event, full scale exercise, etc.

COMPLETE THESE ITEMS AT THE END OF THE EVALUATION PERIOD:

Number and Kind of Resources: Enter how many resources of each kind assigned to the incident pertinent to the trainee's task book position. (e.g. 2 mobile communications vehicles)

Duration: Enter inclusive dates during which the trainee was evaluated. If evaluation occurs during a short term situation, enter date and start and end time of evaluation. (e.g. 11/1/14 to 11/4/14)

Management Level or Complexity Level: Indicates ICS organization level, i.e., Type 5, Type 4, Type 3, Type 2, Type 1, Area Command.

Recommendation: Check as appropriate and/or make comments regarding the future needs for development of this trainee.

Date: List the date the record is being completed.

Evaluator's initials: Evaluator initials here to authenticate their recommendations and to allow for comparison with initials in the Qualifications Record.

Evaluator's relevant rating: Evaluator lists their certification relevant to the trainee position they supervised.
